

Betting Self-exclusion Scheme Rollout

Coming next month, Australia will introduce the "BetStop" scheme, a groundbreaking register that empowers gamblers to self-exclude themselves from all online betting platforms across the entire country. This initiative comes nearly five years after the initial legislation was introduced to parliament.

The BetStop register will replace existing state and territory systems that have faced criticism for their ineffectiveness in covering all bookmakers. This nationwide self-exclusion service will be launched on August 21, under the guidance of the federal government.

BetStop is a user-friendly and cost-free platform designed to assist individuals in managing their gambling habits. It enables users to opt-out from all legally operating online or phone betting operations in Australia through a simple and unified process.

Once a self-exclusion period is chosen, the registered wagering providers are legally required to decline any bets or refrain from opening new accounts for the individuals in question. Additionally, they are prohibited from sending direct marketing messages to those who have registered with BetStop, providing added protection.

Moreover, individuals utilising BetStop will have the option to designate up to five support persons who can help them in managing their self-exclusion period. Rest assured, all personal details of the users will be safeguarded to maintain privacy and confidentiality.

Unhappy Traders

The fate of Australian producers using terms like "prosecco" and "feta" hangs in the balance as trade talks with the European Union reach a critical juncture. These trade negotiations between Australia and Europe have been ongoing for five years.

Australian producers are seeking permission from Europe to continue using specific names for their products. However, the European Union is cautious about the agricultural imports Australia wishes to send to the EU as part of the trade deal.

According to a former top EU official, both Australia and Europe will likely need to make concessions on contentious names like "Prosecco" and "feta" if they want to realise a comprehensive trade deal, which could potentially be valued at almost \$100 billion.

Despite earlier expectations of a quick resolution, the negotiations between Australia and the EU have been protracted and continue to require careful consideration and compromise from both parties.

Caged Eggs Phase-out

After a meeting among Australia's agriculture ministers, the decision to phase out battery eggs has been delegated to state and territory governments. This follows the endorsement of an updated version of the Australian Animal Welfare Standards and Guidelines for Poultry, which was the outcome of an independent review panel's assessment last year.



Federal Agriculture Minister, Murray Watt, has confirmed that the poultry industry will adopt new standards aimed at eliminating battery eggs by 2036. However, the implementation timeline is now subject to the discretion of each state and territory.

The NSW government, being the most populous state with a substantial poultry industry, has expressed its commitment to proceed with its own timeline for the phase-out of battery eggs. They stress the importance of consulting with producers before finalising any specific timelines.



In a groundbreaking move, the International Cricket Council (ICC) has officially declared equal prize money for men's and women's teams participating in ICC events. This momentous decision was reached during the ICC Annual Conference, held in Durban, South Africa, and marks a significant milestone in the ICC's pursuit of prize money parity by 2030, surpassing their previously set timeline.

Under this new policy, teams finishing in similar positions at comparable events will now receive equal prize money. Additionally, the amount awarded for winning a match at these events will be the same for both men's and women's teams.

Moreover, the prize money for the upcoming ICC Women's Cricket World Cup has been raised to \$3.5 million, a significant increase from the \$2 million awarded for winning the 2017 edition held in England. These changes reflect the ICC's commitment to promoting gender equality and recognising the achievements of women in the sport.

QLD is the Last State to Ban Phones in Schools

Queensland has recently joined other states in prohibiting the use of mobile phones in schools, making it the last state to do so. This new policy applies to all school hours, from the first bell to the last, encompassing lunch and recess periods as well. It builds upon the previous measures taken by almost all state schools, which had already implemented some form of mobile phone restrictions.

In April, New South Wales (NSW) announced a similar ban for public secondary school students, scheduled to take effect from Term 4, 2023. This move aligns NSW high schools with the regulations in place in South Australia, the Northern Territory, Victoria, and Western Australia. Prior to this announcement, mobile phones were already banned in NSW public primary schools.



Ku-ring-gai Council's Community Funding Announced

u-ring-gai Council has recently announced the allocation of nearly \$250,000 in funding to support a range of community-driven projects for the 2023-2024 period. The funding is aimed at promoting environmental initiatives, preserving local heritage, enhancing community arts, and facilitating various events.

The decision on funding distribution was made during the Council's meeting during July, following a thorough review of grant and sponsorship applications. In total, \$243,644 will be dispersed throughout the financial year to support several worthy causes.


A significant portion of the funding, amounting to \$100,000, has been allocated for community environmental and Net Zero projects through the Environmental Levy Grants program. This marks the 25th round of funding under Ku-ring-gai's environmental levy, which focuses on projects designed to protect and restore the natural environment and reduce greenhouse gas emissions.

Among the projects to be supported are the establishment of a bush tucker garden at Lindfield Public School, bushland restoration at Auluba Oval in Turramurra, and waste and recycling initiatives at various schools. Additionally, a series of events aimed at promoting solar energy uptake in Kuring-gai will also be funded.

Furthermore, 14 submissions for events and arts sponsorships have been approved for funding. Several exciting community events, such as the Wahroonga Food & Wine Festival, the Special Olympics Ku-ring-gai Fun Run, the Bare Creek Trail Run, Dogs in the Park, and the Ku-ring-gai Art Society annual art exhibition, will receive financial support.

Notably, organisations such as the Kuring-gai Philharmonic Orchestra and Marian Street Theatre for Young People will also benefit from the funding.

The Council has received 19 applications for heritage grants, and they have been carefully considered to allocate the available funding. A total of \$63,589 will be distributed among high priority, medium priority, and low priority heritage projects.



Wahroonga Food & Wine Festival and the restoration of bushland at Auluba Oval in Turramurra is two of the initiatives to be supported by the funding.

Examples of the projects that will receive support include tuckpointing of brick facades in Pymble and Roseville, timber cladding repair in St Ives, roof repairs and tiling in Pymble and Lindfield, as well as the restoration of distinctive curved windows at a Killara home and repairs to a decorative ceiling in a Gordon property.

Overall, this funding initiative underscores the Council's commitment to enhancing the community's wellbeing and preserving the natural and cultural heritage of the region.


Through these diverse projects and initiatives, Ku-ring-gai aims to foster a

sustainable and vibrant community for the benefit of its residents and visitors alike.

Mayor Jeff Pettett has said the Council will continue funding for projects and events that 'can demonstrate a real benefit to the local community'.

Council Asks for Feedback on Household Clean-up

K u-ring-gai Council is seeking community feedback to determine the best approach for household clean-up collections, which are used by approximately 28,000 households to dispose of bulky waste, including furniture and small appliances.

Two options are being considered:

- 1. Move to a new system where each household can book four free clean-up collections annually, allowing households to select the dates.
- **2.** Retain the existing system where each household can use the three Council-scheduled collection dates and book one free clean-up collection on a date chosen by the household.

Currently, there is no change to the existing collection system. If the Ku-ring-gai Council decides to adopt the new system, it will come into effect in March 2024.

"It was valuable to listen firsthand to businesses, such as Goodfields Eatery. They gave us a valuable perspective and feedback that will help us when Parliament resumes."



Claiming Notional Estate

hen you die, your assets are given to the people you have named in your will. You cannot give assets like superannuation and jointly-owned property away in your will. In NSW, a Supreme Court Judge can order these sorts of assets to become part of your estate. This is called notional estate.

Recently in the Supreme Court of NSW, two stepchildren, Justin and Alicia, made a claim against their stepmother. The stepmother and the stepchildren's father jointly-owned a property and a bank account. The property and bank account became the stepmother's when their father died.

Making a claim for notional estate in NSW must be done within a year of death. The Court may accept reasons for lateness under special circumstances. Justin claimed two years after his father's death. His reasons for claiming late were:

1. He did not know he could make a claim 2. He did not seek legal advice 3. He was trying to negotiate with the stepmother.

Alicia claimed two years and six months after her father's death. Her reasons for claiming late were:

- 1. She did not know she could make a claim until she was aware of her brother's claim
- 2. The stepmother refused to provide the deceased's will

When giving evidence, Justin and Alicia were untruthful. Justin claimed the stepmother would not allow visits to the deceased and she would not communicate with him. However, the Court found the stepmother provided updates to Justin when the deceased was unwell. The stepmother kept in touch with Justin after the deceased death and sent money to his children.

Alicia claimed the stepmother refused to provide the deceased's will. The Court found two emails sent by Alicia to the stepmother. The first email requested the will. The second email thanked and acknowledged she had received the will. When these emails were given to the Court, Alicia claimed her email was hacked.



The stepmother was truthful. The Court doubted the evidence of the stepchildren and decided none of their reasons were special circumstances.

When designating assets to be notional estate, the Court must be careful. The Court must ensure that it will not interfere with reasonable expectations of the parties. The Court noted both stepchildren were wealthy and the stepmother had a happy marriage with their father. The stepmother submitted if Justin and Alicia's claims were successful, she would have to relocate and sell the property. She submitted this was unreasonable and unexpected given her age. The Court accepted the stepmother's submissions and dismissed both stepchildren's claims. The Judge ordered each party to pay their own legal costs.



Swain Gardens

B ooks and gardens: they do go together. Both take hard work to produce, but give immense pleasure. It is fitting that the history of two delightful public gardens is intertwined with a Sydney bookshop.

One of these gardens is Everglades at Leura in the Blue Mountains. It is a terraced cold-climate garden spread over 5.2 hectares. Much of its current design dates from the 1930s and 1940s when noted landscape gardener Paul Sorensen designed both house and garden. Around 1959, Killara resident Arthur (Mick) Swain bought Everglades through his city bookshop, Swain and Co. Then another city bookshop, Angus & Robertson, bought Swain and Co. With Mick's help, the National Trust bought Everglades in 1966. It remains in the Trust's care and is open to the public.

The second garden is Swain Gardens at 77 Stanhope Road, Killara. With the sale of his bookshop and Everglades, Mick Swain focused on his home garden. He expanded the garden into the gully behind his house and up the other side so that it spread over 3.4 hectares. This expansion occurred primarily in the 1940s-60s with the help of expert gardeners and Lebanese-Australian stone masons.

Swain Gardens' similarity to Everglades can be seen in the terraces, the curved sandstone walls, and the focus on cold climate bushes, notably camellias, azaleas and rhododendrons. While the Gardens have an all-seasons appeal, and the autumn foliage is delightful, they are at their best in spring when its bushes are in flower. One of the stone bridges in the lower garden is of special interest as some of its blocks came from Sydney's historic Tank Stream, unearthed during excavations when building Swain and Co's bookshop.

Mick Swain died in 1973, leaving his Gardens to the National Trust, along with two houses. Personal networks had a role in his decision, notably his family's friendship with the Wyatt family. Annie Wyatt advocated a range of social, cultural and environmental reforms and, amongst other things, was a founder of the first National Trust in Australia. Annie's son Ivor shared her commitment to the National Trust, including as President during 1969-73.

In 1979-80 the Gardens were transferred to Ku-ring-gai Council on condition that they would be permanently maintained as a public park or reserve. Consequently, entry to this beautiful garden is free. Not all councillors welcomed the acquisition especially as only one of the houses Mick Swain left to the Trust came with it. As the Gardens were very neglected, volunteers swung into action to help restore it. Today the Friends of Swain Gardens continue this essential work.

Ku-ring-gai Council formed the Swain Gardens Advisory Committee consisting of councillors and residents. When you visit the Gardens, you can see memorial plaques to two women who chaired the Committee: Mary Haynes and Heather Pittar. You can also see where the local Lions Club took an active interest, including planting rhododendrons.

If you prefer native flora, there are two bushland reserves adjoining Swain Gardens. The first, the Swain Reserve, was created in 1960 after Mick Swain discovered that the St Ives Development Company had bought the land to build houses. Through Swain & Co., Mick donated money which enabled the National Trust to buy the land for a reserve. Swain Reserve was transferred to Ku-ring-gai Council in 1998.

The second reserve, the Wombin Reserve, was created in 1963 from a donation of land by Ernest Bryce. Like the Swains and

Wyatts, he was heavily involved in environmental matters. He donated the land to be a much-needed sanctuary for native birds and animals. Later, another local resident, Brian Harper, and the State Government donated parcels of land to substantially increase the size of the reserve.

Mick Swain was a keen photographer, and it is fitting that today Swain Gardens are a favourite place for wedding photos. It is also an ideal place for picnics but, most of all, a place to stop and appreciate how lucky we are that Mick Swain wanted to share his beloved gardens with the community.

Free Flu Vaccine for those aged 65+

A s the cold and flu season edges towards its close, it's important we don't become complacent with our flu vaccines. Recent data reveals that during a two-week period in June more than 9,000 people in NSW were diagnosed with influenza, and there has been an increase in the number of individuals presenting to NSW emergency departments since June with influenza-like illness.

The concerns regarding influenza continued into July after the tragic deaths of two girls who contracted influenza B. The heartbreaking incidents have triggered calls for more urgency around flu vaccination, emphasising that it is never too late to get vaccinated for the flu this season.

NSW Health has stressed the importance of people aged 65 and over to book their free influenza (flu) vaccine through their GP or local pharmacy. This extension comes amid concerns of moderate levels of influenza transmission within NSW communities.

NSW Chief Health Officer, Dr. Kerry Chant, emphasises that while everyone aged six months or older is recommended to get their flu vaccine as soon as possible, it is particularly important for priority groups, such as people aged 65 and over, to ensure they are vaccinated against influenza.

"Older people are at higher risk of suffering severe illness from influenza, so I would remind people of the importance of getting vaccinated this winter because doing so will reduce your likelihood of catching influenza, but will also lower your chances of needing to be hospitalised if you do get it."

Visit your local pharmacy where a pharmacist can administer your flu shot. Head to the NSW Government website (*www.nsw.gov.au/health/influenza*) where more information on influenza can be found.

new immersive learning centre is extending carers beyond the classroom, putting them into simulated environments that provide more specialised care to help Australians age at home.

With features including simulated living room and bathroom amenities, in-home care provider Home Instead's State Training Centre of Excellence in Thornleigh is the third state-based academy to open in Australia this year. This will provide training for CAREGivers across the wider Sydney area.

The focus is very much on learning through real-world scenarios.

Home Instead has also tailored the training in response to the growing incidence of age-related illnesses such as Parkinson's Disease, which statistics say affects one in every 308 Australians; and dementia, the







second leading cause of death in Australia, affecting more than 400,000 Australians.

Steph said they were excited to open the New South Wales Home Instead Academy State Training Centre of Excellence, with the first cohort of trainees already enhancing their skills on site. "It's expected 1000 trainees will complete training at the centre this year, providing 26,000 additional hours of elderly care to those in need."

Home Instead Thornleigh Business Operations Manager, Matt Crossley said "We know that more and more Australians are wanting to age in their own homes, with their families, their pets, and among their treasured possessions and memories, so we are dedicated to making this happen,".

Matt said research showed in-home aged care was the preferred option for care for older Australians.

Savouring the Future

t's easy to get caught up in negative thoughts about things going on now, or in the past. One way to deal with this, and to boost your mood, is to anticipate the good times to come. This is also known as savouring the future. Numerous studies suggest that having something to look forward to boosts your mood and lowers your stress.

Step one is to plan and organise your life so that you do have good things ahead. I find, particularly when I'm feeling a bit down, that texting a friend to organise a catch-up for a weeks time (give or take), then means I have something to look forward to all week. For something bigger, try visualising a trip you have planned (even if it's months away), search for information on where you are going, talk to friends about it, picture yourself there and how much you will be enjoying it. Even just noticing that the weather is going to be fine tomorrow, so planning a sunny walk alone can help.

Then the next step is creating a detailed mental picture of a positive anticipated event (which must be realistic and achievable), incorporating remembered or anticipated sights, sounds, physical sensations, thoughts and emotions you will encounter and move through the event in your imagination. You can also create and mentally rehearse preferred outcomes. Also, acknowledge the actions you will need to attain these positive outcomes. These characteristics of anticipation are implicated in planning, goaldirected behaviour, emotional regulation, and decision-making.

However, be careful what you are thinking during anticipation, as one experiment found the use of dampening appraisals (e.g. thinking 'this is too good to last', or 'I don't deserve this') led to a reduction in happiness and an increase in sadness.

Remember you are the future beneficiary of your thoughts, emotions and actions.


play a crucial role in establishing a genuine bond with the recipients.

When a **Bear Wore** No Pants



id you grow up watching Here's Humphrey on TV? He was a shaggy brown bear in a straw boater hat, tartan waistcoat and oversized yellow bow tie, but sans trousers, who loved dancing and honey.

The show was set in a magic forest where Humphrey lived in his tree house. As he never spoke, but mimed everything, he was assisted by another presenter who interpreted his adventures. Humphrey continued a long line of mute children's characters including Andy Pandy, Sooty, Woodstock from Peanuts, Tom and Jerry, the Pink Panther, Fat Cat, Wile E. Coyote and the Road Runner.

Humphrey's appeal to pre-school children was based on him being like a curious, accident prone 4-year-old who never grew up. As its early theme song said: "What a funny old fellow is Humphrey. He gets in all manner of strife".

The show was first produced in the Adelaide studios of NWS-9 in 1965, before going national in 1967. The part of Humphrey was a well-kept secret. It was originally played by Edwin Duryea, (c.1930-2009) an actor, singer and dancer ironically nick-named Ted. Duryea's character was initially called Bear Bear but named Humphrey in 1965 after an on-air competition. This made him Humphrey Bear Bear, subsequently abbreviated to Humphrey B. Bear.

Humphrey merchandising was extensive. There were Humphrey soft toys, puppets,

Five Dental Urban Myths

or everything we do, there is an "urban myth" or "old wives' tale", telling us how we should be completing the task. Dentistry is no different. So, how do these preconceptions effect dentistry?

FLOSSING MAKES MY GUMS BLEED A healthy gum will not bleed. A bleeding gum is generally a sign of infection or inflammation, generally due to plaque or calculus build up beneath the gum line. Flossing will help to remove bacteria between teeth. If you floss regularly and your gums still bleed, you should consult your dentist and have a professional clean.

HARD BRUSHES WORK BETTER ▲ Hard or extra hard toothbrushes are far more likely to be responsible for toothbrush abrasion. A hard toothbrush will wear away tooth enamel over time. Hard brushes may also increase the rate

of gum recession, resulting in longer more sensitive teeth. A soft or extra soft toothbrush, and proper brushing technique is always the preferred option.

3 YOU CAN'T SEE YOUR DENTIST WHEN YOU ARE PREGNANT Pregnancy is a time of great hormonal

changes that may affect the gum health, resulting in inflammation/redness and swelling. This is quite common, however should be monitored by a dentist. Regular dental check-ups are recommended throughout pregnancy. Toward the final stages of pregnancy, lying flat may be uncomfortable for some women, however most dental chairs allow for a more elevated position that is comfortable for patient and dentist alike.

I LOST THE CALCIUM FROM MY **4**. TEETH DURING PREGNANCY

Teeth, once formed, are susceptible to tooth decay from acid attack caused by plaque build-up, however the calcium in a tooth will not be "leached" out during pregnancy.

ALCOHOL MOUTHWASHES **J** WORK BETTER

Although both are effective in reducing plaque and gingivitis, Alcohol containing mouth washes have been shown to induce a greater degree of cellular damage in the mouth, potentially leading to mouth cancer, particularly when used with other risk factors such as smoking or alcohol.



Viral TikTok Recipes **Tried and Tested**

ll of our *Sydney Observer* team members are massive foodies – no doubt about it. Lately, a lot of us have been getting dinner inspiration from social media app TikTok, where the pros share their tips and tricks. Here's our favourite viral recipes that are delightfully delicious.

Green Goddess Salad

(serves 4)

- 1 small head of green cabbage
- A small bunch of spring onions
- Half a cucumber.
- 1 cup basil leaves.
- 1 cup fresh spinach.
- 2 garlic cloves.
- 2 lemons juiced.
- 1/4 cup olive oil.
- 1/4 unsalted cashews.
- 2 tbsp. rice wine vinegar.
- 1. Blend together the basil, spinach, garlic cloves, lemon juice, olive oil, cashews and rice wine vinegar in a blender or food processor. This will be the salad's dressing.
- 2. Add the dressing to a large bowl. Next, finely chop the green cabbage, spring onions and cucumber and add this to the bowl. Mix together, season to taste. Seriously delicious, and would be great with added chunks of avocado too or eaten with corn chips.

Sweet potato brownies

- 1 cup cooked sweet potato.
- 1 cup almond butter.
- 1/2 cup maple syrup.
- 1/3 cup cocoa powder.
- Chocolate chips optional.



- potato, almond butter, maple syrup, cocoa powder and chocolate chips if desired. Add to a brownie tray that is lined with baking paper.
- 3. Put the tray in the oven for 180°C and cook for 18 minutes, checking often from the 12-minute mark. It tastes great and you wouldn't know it's been made with sweet potato!

Baked feta pasta

- (serves 4)
 - One block of Aussie feta.
 - Two punnets of tomatoes of your choice.

 - 1 tbs. olive oil. - 1 garlic clove.

1. Cook your sweet potato accordingly, as long as you are left with one cup of cooked sweet potato to use. No skins, just the inside of the potato.

2. In a bowl, mix together the sweet

- Small bunch of basil.
- Cooked pasta of your choice.
- 1. In a small tray, place your block of feta in the centre, add in the tomatoes around the feta, and drizzle all in olive oil. Bake in the oven for 200°C for 30 minutes or until the feta is golden and the tomatoes are cooked. Halfway in the cooking process, add in the diced garlic and chopped basil to the tray.
- 2. Take the tray out of the oven once ready and mix it all together.
- **3.** Cook your pasta accordingly, reserving 1/2 a cup of pasta water before draining.
- 4. In the tray, add back in your pasta, the reserved pasta water, mix and season to taste. Garnish with extra basil.

Bringing together the flavours of the Middle East and moreish melt in your mouth lamb shanks, this dinner is sure to delight. The feast will take around 4 to 5 hours to create in total, however it's not at all labour intensive and the flavour pay off is well and truly worth it.

I've enjoyed variations of this meal with my father and I'm sure he will testify to its deliciousness! Warm, unctuous stew, buttery fragrant rice, creamy feta like cheese and a zesty, bright and crunchy salad; this spread has it all.

Lamb Shanks

Ingredients

- 4 lamb shanks (about 1.2kg in total)
- 2tbs EVOO
- 2tbs harissa
- 1 large yellow or brown onion, sliced
- 8 garlic cloves, chopped (or 8 tsp minced garlic)
- 3 cups water
- 3 cups chicken stock
- ¹/₂ bunch parsley, chopped
- 2 medium tomatoes, chopped
- 1tsp turmeric
- 1 tsp salt
- ¹/₄ tsp nutmeg
- ¹/₂ tsp cinnamon
- ¹/₄ tsp saffron threads

Method

- 1. Rub shanks with salt and pepper.
- **2.** Heat 1 tbsp oil in an oven safe pot over medium high heat and brown shanks on all sides before removing from pot to rest. **3.** Discard the excess oil and clean your pot
- if there's any blackened residue. 4. Add 1 tbsp oil and cook onion, parsley,
- harissa paste and garlic for approx 2 mins, or until onion is translucent and softened, then stir in the turmeric, cardamom, nutmeg, cinnamon, tomatoes, and salt.



Ingredients

- 3 Lebanese cucumbers, diced
- · ½ red onion, diced

Salad-e Shirazi

- 2 tbs chopped parsley
- 1tbs chopped mint
- 2 medium tomatoes chopped
- 3tbs EVOO



Living It Up in a Former Prison

or 146 years, when the bleak bluestone walls of Melbourne's Pentridge Prison fortified one of the most notorious and feared jails in Australian history, inmates were desperate to escape the place. Today, 26 years after its closure, people are instead clamouring to check in to Pentridge following a startling \$1 billion transformation that turned a stark place of brutality and misery into a vibrant urban hub and lifestyle precinct.

From 1851 to 1997, Pentridge was Victoria's main prison, housing a who's who of Australia's criminal world from bushranger Ned Kelly and gangster Squizzy Taylor to celebrity mobster Chopper Read, and the infamous Ronald Ryan who murdered a prison officer during a failed escape from Pentridge and was subsequently hanged there in 1867, making him the last person to be executed in Australia.

The former jail's imposing, neo-Gothic walls still border the area but Pentridge has cast off the shackles of its shadowy past and opened the walls to a luxury new hotel, starring a gourmet restaurant, swish wine bar, bustling craft brewery, a cinema complex and a supermarket. Certainly hard to comprehend for former inmates visiting today. A local Indigenous elder has even conducted a cleansing ceremony on the site earlier this year to rid it of negative energy.

The stunning redevelopment of the historic site seems incongruous but the juxtaposition of dark heritage and contemporary indulgence has proven very effective and popular. The once impenetrable doors of Pentridge have now been unshackled for all those who seek relaxation, pampering and connection, in a place once infamous for the opposite.







At the heart of this new hip-fab urban sanctuary in the suburb of Coburg, just 8km North of the Melbourne CBD, is the shiny, 18-storey-high Adina Apartment Hotel Pentridge Melbourne, a deluxe, intrigue-filled hotel like no other in Australia where doing time today is a veritable pleasure and not a punishment.

The gleaming, new, five-star, all-glass, 106room Adina Pentridge has been deliberately designed to contrast and complement the austere prison setting and is one of just 40 prison hotel conversions worldwide.

The luxe hotel shares the former B Division jail wing with an elegant, gourmet

restaurant, North & Common, and a decadent wine bar, Olivine. And soon to open is The Interlude, an indulgent, 19-suite 'experience-led urban retreat' where guests will stay in lavishly transformed prison cells with exclusive access to an underground, candlelit relaxation pool and sunset cocktails in the former exercise yards outside.

We stayed in an upper-level, spacious, two-bedroom apartment with a generous lounge, 55-inch LCD TV on which we watched the movie, 'Chopper' about the celebrity criminal's time in Pentridge, a dining space, plush beds, USB charging points, two bathrooms, luxuriant tub, fully



equipped kitchen and laundry, espresso coffee machine, locally made chocolate, chips, wine and vast vistas over the jail site and across Melbourne.

Before dinner we indulged in cocktails at the Olivine Wine Bar adjacent to the Adina. Here, prison cells have been transformed into a swish lounge bar where we grazed on rock oysters with peach mignonette dressing, house-made chicken liver parfait with muscat and brown butter tuile and Japanese scallop tarts with a yuzu emulsion. All mouth-watering.

The palate tantalisation segued next door at the North & Common restaurant.

Once a jail mess hall, the airy space is now a sophisticated dining room boasting an innovative, produce-driven menu brimming with flavour, providence and quality such as the citrus cured cobia, spanner crab risoni and salted cashew praline with banana and coconut that I enjoyed, along with premium Victorian wines.

The next day, we visited the onsite art gallery showcasing local artists and creative depictions of Pentridge and then joined one of the new daily tours of the heritage-listed prison. The gripping but confronting tours of H (nicknamed 'Hell') and B Divisions, with their gloomy cells and rock-breaking yards, shine a light on the jail's darkest times. It's certainly a sobering experience, offset afterwards by a visit to the new Brewdog Pentridge craft brewery next door which offers a mindboggling array of boutique ales and cocktails as well as burgers, loaded fries, spicy chicken wings and pizzas.

We didn't have time to ride the Adina's complimentary bikes on the cycle track along neighbouring Merri Creek, but there's clearly a lot to experiences to be had at Pentridge in its new 21st Century

guise. The whole complex is a destination in itself, offering powerful and unique encounters. A short break here is far from an ordinary hotel stay. And unlike former inmates, you'll want to stay instead of leave.

The Wild West: Our Guide to the Coral Coast Highway

T ith 12,500 kilometres of coastline and around 3,500 beaches, there aren't many places on the planet that can beat Western Australia for sprawling sandy shores and rugged ocean vistas.

There are plenty of welltrodden paths through Australia's largest state, too. A road trip through the Kimberley will take you to the north-eastern corner of W.A. between the towns of Broome and Kununurra on the border of the Northern Territory. Or you can venture south from Perth to the Margaret River and as far as Albany on the south-western tip of Australia.

But the ultimate W.A. bucket list item remains the 1,200-kilometre road trip between state capital, Perth, and the Ningaloo Reef, also known as the Coral Coast Highway. The journey takes travellers through some of the country's most spectacular national parks, pristine isolated beaches, and active ocean life, with dolphins, dugongs and whale sharks just some of the stunning species you're likely to spot on your way.

Many Sydneysiders bypass the road trip entirely. Exmouth has a nearby airport, Learmonth, which means you can fly straight to the Ningaloo Reef surrounds via a connection at Perth. But, if you want to experience the full spectrum of W.A.'s wild wonders, a roundtrip from Perth to Exmouth via camper-van is the only way to go.

The road is straight up and down, straddling the turquoise Indian Ocean on one side, and the rugged red-dirt outback on the other. It's your choice which stop-offs to make on the way up, and which ones to leave for the return leg. Our itinerary makes sure the 13-hour-total drive is split up into manageable chunks, and

These natural limestone towers were thought to have formed between 25,000 and 30,000 years ago, but scientists are still unsure exactly how they were created. You can drive through a 4.5km trail that winds around these beautiful and fascinating structures. **Stay:** Nambung Station Stay is a great spot that features basic amenities and prized proximity to the pinnacles. www.nambungstation.com.au

Exmouth to Shark Bay (~6 hours)

The remote Shell Beach is also a quiet place to relax, its white sand has been made from crushed cockle shells stacked nearly 10 metres thick. Stay: Hamelin Station Stay is located on a picturesque wildlife reserve, in strolling distance of stromatolites, and boasts unrivalled views of the night sky. https://www.hamelinstationstay.com.au

Shark Bay to Geraldton (~4 hours) End your trip with a return to home comforts at Geraldton. A perfectly placed

stop-off between Shark Bay and Perth, this small seaside city is gaining popularity as a relaxing beachy escape. The city centre is bustling with cafes, street art and galleries, and for those still seeking a bit of adventure, you can snorkel off the nearby Abrolhos Islands or take the Yamaji Drive Trail which joins up 14 local heritage sites. **Stay:** There are fewer options for rustic station stays in the city, but no shortage of places to leave your camper for the night. Geraldton to Perth (~4 hours)

If you have a few hours to spare before dropping off your camper, take a trip into Perth for stroll around its soft-sand beaches. scenic parks and numerous cultural attractions. You can also visit the koalas at Yanchep National Park, just north of the city, for a final wildlife encounter before flying back to the east coast.


